As we turn ten years old, Earth Care's contributions to youth empowerment; just, local food; relevant education; and bringing recognition to positive initiatives in sustainability in Santa Fe can be seen throughout our community.

Each year through our programs, youth work to develop public education campaigns and community projects that meet pressing social and environmental needs. In many ways, including through publication of our annual Sustainable Santa Fe magazine, Earth Care provides excellent resources to Santa Feans for organizing, networking, activism, and education. We also have a Mobile Toolshed for group gardening days and a lending library of books at our office. We continue to expand and provide opportunities to engage with our community, such as hosting Earth Day with the City of Santa Fe or marching for Mother Earth at the iMatter march.

In fact, Bianca Sopoci-Belknap, our Youth and Community Programs Director, was awarded the Young Leaders' Advocate of the Year by the Young Non-Profit Professionals Network in 2010. Congratulations to Bianca and her incredible work establishing meaningful friendships and collaborative projects with youth to better their community and their own lives.

I believe that the next generation has important contributions to make to the sustainability movement,

and I ask you to be an ally to the young people in your life. Listen to their ideas. Make space for their genuine participation. Empower them to be leaders.

As always, my sincere appreciation goes to the many partners, fantastic teachers, individual supporters and volunteers, and the young leaders for whom this organization exists and without whom none of our work would be possible. # Executive Director's Letter

Dear Friends of Earth Care,

Happy 10th Birthday to Earth Care! For a decade, Earth Care has been working with young people to create change that builds more healthy, just and sustainable communities. Over our first nine years, we worked with 4,000 young people in our community. Astoundingly, in this past year alone, Earth Care reached 4,000 children and youth with successful programs that have a demonstrable impact on the community. This is a testament to our high capacity for achievement and the relevancy of our programs even in tough economic times.

For the past decade, through programs and publications, Earth Care has played an important role in shaping the local discourse on the role of youth in community, and moving beyond band-aid approaches to environmental issues towards a more holistic approach that takes into account social and economic impacts, cultural change, and personal and intergenerational responsibility.

As the economic recession continues to hit the middle and working class the hardest, Earth Care has adapted our programming to address hunger and health issues, provided educators to local schools and engaged students in helping schools reduce their environmental impact and costs. These activities provide the means to positive youth development. We are engaging young people in positive solutions and actions in a time when they are urgently needed.

Earth Care continues to weather the economic recession through prudent budgeting and sound fiscal management. In fact, we have taken a lead in filling economic gaps within our community by bringing in federal and national foundation dollars to create jobs in collaboration with four other non-profits, six schools, and with the City and County government that address our community's food, economic development, and educational needs.


Over the past three years, Earth Care implemented a dynamic strategic plan to expand opportunities for youth, grow and strengthen our programming, and increase our impact on building a sustainable community. We have done this successfully -- all on a tighter budget. Through our new Food Cadre program we are working with the Santa Fe Alliance, Santa Fe Farmers Market Institute, Cooking with Kids, HomeGrown NM, City and County of Santa Fe, Santa Fe Food Policy Council, Farm to Table and the Santa Fe Public Schools to ensure healthy

food for all. Through Youth Allies we partner with the Santa Fe Mountain Center, Youth Media Project, SFPS Energy Conservation Program and over 20 other local organizations who offer mentorship and engagement opportunities to nurture Santa Fe's young leaders. Our Sustainable Schools program works in collaboration with 12 schools, the SFPS Energy Conservation Program, National Wildlife Federation, Earth Works and Root & Shoots.

Over the next three years our strategy will involve continuing to grow and deepen our community and national partnerships; increase our capacity to demonstrate and deepen our impact in the community in our four areas of focus: food and health, education, civic participation, and social entrepreneurship, and strengthen our financial resolve in these continuing uncertain economic times.

This work cannot be done without YOU: our community partners, teachers, mentors, elders, volunteers, businesses, and friends who believe young people are the leaders of today and can make a valuable contribution in our community. When you engage with Earth Care, you not only learn how to live a life in balance with our environment and get involved in your community, you also support the hands-on work of young people who are making that a reality!

# Youth Allies for Sustainability

## EMPOWERING YOUNG CHANGE MAKERS

Youth Allies creates opportunities for young people in our community to discover their voices, act on their convictions for a more just and sustainable world, and realize their full potential as individuals, community members, and stewards of the earth. The program brings together high school youth from diverse backgrounds to train in cross-cultural leadership, sustainability, and social justice. Youth participants receive ongoing mentorship as they create social change projects and campaigns that improve our community and our world.

Since 2006 hundreds of young people have participated in Youth Allies programming. In 2010 thirty-three youth leaders completed the Leadership Institute and Organizing programs. Youth Allies community-change projects made tangible impacts in our community. From eliminating Styrofoam in public school cafeterias, to feeding hundreds of hungry community members, to teaching 1,732 students about making a difference on important environmental and social issues –Youth Allies participants are building a youth-led movement for positive change in our community.

Produced 5 radio shows and 4 radio segments (in partnership with Youth Media Project) where youth were able to discuss issues of social justice and sustainability that are important to them.

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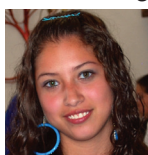

# Sustainable Schools


MAKING EDUCATION RELEVANT & MEANINGFUL

Earth Care's Sustainable Schools program continues to work on transforming schools and education to become more relevant and engaging for students and more sustainable for the planet.

We launched a new arm of the Program this year to support school gardens and student-led efforts to reduce the environmental impact of schools. With the support of AmeriCorps, we provided six Garden and Sustainability Educators from our Food Cadre to nine schools. These educators taught life sciences, sustainable agriculture, and nutrition; addressed childhood obesity and hunger issues; and grew food for school meal programs and events. Food Cadre members engaged 1,752 students in sustainability and garden-based education.

- 125 students at four schools created service-learning projects to reduce energy consumption and waste at their schools through our Eco-Schools

curriculum in partnership with the National Wildlife Federation and Santa Fe Public School's Energy Conservation Program. Students conducted environmental audits, studied the food system from farm to cafeteria, and led peer-education campaigns to encourage change in behaviors and attitudes that affect the environmental impact of their schools.

- Earth Care offered teacher workshops to support teachers in preparing student-led service-learning projects for Global Youth Service Days on April 15-17th. We also partnered with SFPS Professional Development Academy to offer a series of summer Science in the Garden workshops to more than 25 K-12 teachers who learned about food gardens, creating wildlife habitats and lessons and teaching methods for making science come alive in the garden.
- The Sustainability Education Task Force, coordinated by Earth Care, focused its efforts this year on promoting service-learning and sustainability education through the Sustainable School Awards. In partnership with SFPS Energy Conservation Program and the City of Santa Fe's Sustainability Commission we identified and presented 26 awards to school-based projects that led to reduction of environmental impact and engaged students as leaders.

# Food Cadre

HEALTHY LOCAL FOOD FOR ALL

In 2009 Earth Care initiated the Santa Fe Food Project Coalition in order to support our youth leaders and their food-related projects.

In 2010 we launched the Food Cadre Program in order to bring human resources to improve our food security and develop the next generation of food advocates, food entrepreneurs, and change-makers. We placed 13 Cadre Members in the public schools, nonprofits, and government agencies.

The 2010-2011 Food Cadre's successes Included:

- Mobilizing and engaging 600+ volunteers
- Educating 3,000+ local children and youth in sustainability, gardening, and health
- Organizing community and school events that engaged 2,000+ community members
- Supporting the development or expansion of seven community gardens and nine school gardens
- Providing free labor to 10+ local farms through farm service visits

# Sustainable Santa Fe: A Resource Guide

## HIGHLIGHTING LOCAL INITIATIVES

Since 2006 our community publication has served to forward the dialog on sustainability in our community, and to highlight positive initiatives taking place in Santa Fe. Over a hundred pages of articles, art, and photos connect community members, teachers, students, and businesses with opportunities to learn about and take action for sustainability.

- The 2011 Sustainable Santa Fe: A Resource Guide magazine was the sixth edition of this free publication
- We printed 36,000 copies for year round distribution via Creative Couriers bicycle courier.
- Our circulation is estimated at 90,000 readers, making Sustainable Santa Fe the largest publication in town
- The magazine is printed on residual “waste wood” fiber, and vegetable-based inks.
- 46 community members contributed articles
- Local businesses with an eye toward sustainability were invited to advertise
- For the first time, the magazine included two articles translated into Spanish
- Teachers pick up stacks for use in their classrooms
- Community members continually let us know how valuable the guide is to them in understanding and broadening sustainability efforts in our community

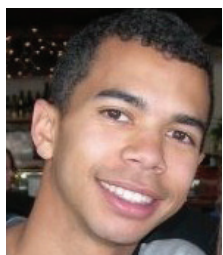

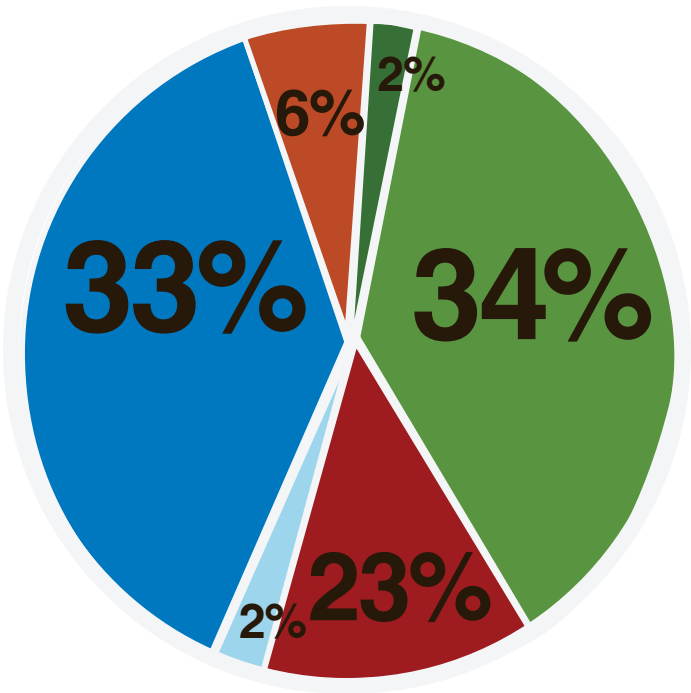

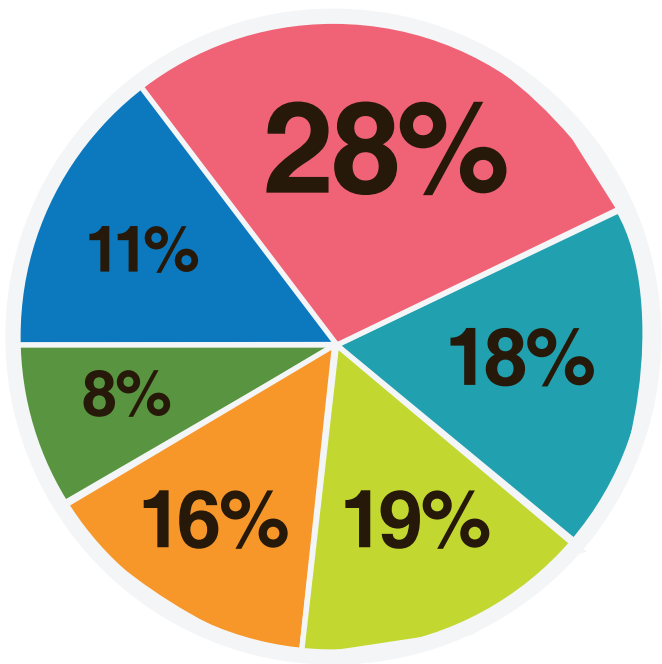
